Our Philosophy

The Seventh-day Adventist Church recognizes God as the ultimate source of existence and truth. In the beginning, God created, in His image, a perfect humanity, a perfection later marred by sin. In Adventist education, schools, homes, and churches are to work cooperatively in preparing learners for effective citizenship both in this life and in the life to come.

Our History

The history of Parkview Adventist Academy goes back to around 1900 when railroad construction and free homesteads attracted settlers to the Prairie Provinces. The academy was the vision of a group of Christian Laymen who purchased farmland in 1907 near Leduc under the name of Alberta Industrial Academy.

In 1909, the present location at Lacombe was selected as a permanent one, and the construction of buildings began. In 1919, the school became known as Canadian Junior College. In 1947, the academy became the High School Division of Canadian Union College. Canadian Union College was later renamed Canadian University College, and now Burman University.

In March of 1982, the academy was officially separated from the College and renamed Parkview Adventist Academy (PAA). The Alberta Conference of Seventh-Day Adventists assumed ownership and operation of the academy in the fall of 2020.

Accreditation

Parkview Adventist Academy is classified by Alberta Education as a fully Accredited Private School, offering courses of study that meet all of the requirements for the Alberta High School Diploma. Parkview Adventist Academy is further accredited by the Board of Regents of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. In addition, it holds a six year accreditation from the denomination's North American Division; the highest available accreditation from the organization.

Admissions Policy

PAA is sponsored and mainly financed by Seventh-day Adventists, as a result the majority of students are members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. However, no particular religious affiliation is required for admission.

Any student is welcome who is of good moral character, is in Grades 10-12, expresses and demonstrates a sincere desire for a Christian education, and pledges to live by the standards of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Before applying for admission, every candidate should take time to become well acquainted with the standards and regulations as outlined in this bulletin. It is understood that once a student has affixed their signature to the application form, they pledge to comply cheerfully and willingly with the program and policies of the school.



Academics

Upon completion of a minimum 100 credits, based upon the Alberta Education requirements, an Alberta High School Diploma will be issued by the province.

Class schedules are designed to permit students to select courses that are within their range of ability and interest. In the areas of English, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies, both general and advanced courses are available to meet the needs of each student. A fine arts program encourages students to develop their musical and artistic abilities. Physical Education, Career and Technology, and Religious Studies promote the formation of the well-rounded, well-informed individual.

The High School Diploma is an official document issued by Alberta Education, certifying that the holder has completed a prescribed program of instruction under the direction and supervision of Alberta Education. Students should be aware that there are a variety of entrance requirements for post-secondary institutions, and they should plan their programs accordingly.

As a high school for students in grades 10-12, PAA strives to create an atmosphere for learning and self-growth.

GRADE 12 SENIOR is defined as: Student registered in sufficient courses to meet

all of the requirements for a high school diploma by the end of the school term.

Change of Program

After a student has completed registration, changes in the program must be made through the PAA Office by means of an Add/Drop Form. To officially withdraw from a class, a student must submit written parental permission to and obtain a voucher from the PAA Office. Once the change has been approved by the Principal or Vice-Principal, the student must return the dropped course textbooks to the teacher, obtain his/her signature on the voucher, and return the voucher to the office. Withdrawing from a class after the stated deadline (which can be found on the PAA website) incurs a charge of \$50.00.

Academic Load

The school year at PAA is divided into two semesters, each of approximately 18 weeks. The maximum academic load (inclusive of both on-site and distance learning) is 18-20 credits per semester.

Deviation from this policy requires the approval of the principal and must be submitted in writing. Students allowed to take an overload will be monitored, and may be required to drop excessive credits.

Correspondence Course Work

Credits completed through a recognized correspondence school will be accepted toward an Alberta High School Diploma.

Students are responsible for completing the correspondence course on their own time. Individual tutorial help is available through the Student Success Centre. The cost for the tutorial help will be given at the time of request.

Students cannot take more than one correspondence course per semester, and then only if the subject is not offered at PAA during the year or if there is a course conflict. Credits by correspondence are included as part of the regular course load. Complete class loads should NOT exceed 20 credits per semester.

Religious Studies

Students attending PAA are required to complete one on-site Religious Studies class for each year of attendance. If a student is taking all the sciences in grades 11 and 12 and a conflict occurs, exemptions will be applied on a case by case basis.

Educational Resources

Laptops/Chromebooks

Students must provide their own Chromebook or laptop for use during their educational tenure at PAA. These devices need to be ready for use on the first day of classes and must come with the student to every class (unless otherwise directed by the teacher). Smartphones or tablets are NOT an adequate substitute.

Curriculum

Senior High School courses are credit weighted and follow Alberta Education Guidelines. Receiving a diploma from PAA is confirmation that a student has successfully completed the High School program with us and reached our high standards.

Sakala Success Centre

The Sakala Success Centre, housed in the lower level of the Administration Building, is designed to meet the needs of students by offering tutoring, counselling, career planning, and testing support. Please contact the success centre to schedule any needed supports or contact our office for assistance.

Flex Time

Flex time occurs each day from 11:15 am—12:00 pm. Its purpose is to support student learning and students are expected to utilize this time in class with a teacher to catch up on missed work, get extra help for subjects or units they are struggling with, or for advanced study.

Community Learning Days (CLDs)

In addition to flex time, Community Learning Days exist to further support student learning. CLDs occur on designated Fridays and offer a broader range of flex time for students beginning at 8:20 am and ending at 11:05 am. CLDs are indicated in the yearly calendar and on the website calendar.

Burman University Library

The library is generally open from 8:00 am to 11:00 pm. A student's ID card is his or her membership to the library. Students have borrowing privileges, access to information literacy, access to books that follow the High School curriculum, use of various research databases, access to the Writing Center (appointment required) and to librarian assistance .

Burman University PE Centre

The PE Centre includes the following: swimming pool, racquetball court, weight room, climbing wall, and a double court gymnasium with hardwood flooring. An outdoor skating rink next to the gymnasium is available for ice skating and hockey.

The Gwen Bader Fitness Centre (weight room) is available for High School use. The membership fee is waived for PAA students who are currently on a PAA sports team or in a PAA PE class. Students can also take swimming certifications through the fitness centre aquatic facility.

Music Building

Students may arrange to take music lessons through Burman University. Please contact the university's music department to sign up for lessons. Fees are charged by the individual instructors. There are practice rooms available within West Hall. Scheduling and usage of these rooms is determined by the Fine Arts Department of Burman University.

Evaluation of Student Progress

Academic Excellence:

Students achieving a final mark of 65% or above in English and Social Studies may continue on at the same level of the program. If a grade of 65% or below is achieved as their final mark, students will need to continue on the "dash 2" level. Math 10C students achieving a final mark of 75% or above may continue in the "dash 1" level. If a grade below 75% is achieved as their final mark, students will need to continue on the "dash 2" level. A student in Science 10 needs to achieve a level of 70% or above to continue on in the Chemistry, Physics, and Biology 20 track. Students who wish to pursue the Chemistry and Physics 20/30 track must also have Math 20-1 to support success in these classes. Students wishing to pursue Biology 30 should have strong math grades as well. Student success is a combination of consistent effort, understanding of the content, work ethic, and ability. If a student is unable to maintain the level of work needed to complete his or her course work, a meeting with the principal will be needed to rework the student's schedule.

Progress regarding a student's grade can be checked on Edsby Grading is expressed in percentages with four levels of performance as follows:

Superior 80-100%

Above Average 65-79%

Average 50-64%

Failure 0-49%

Students achieving a final mark of 65% or above may continue on at the same level.

Attendance Policy

- 1. Attendance record is taken for each class each day via Edsby.
- 2. Students must fill out late and absence slips at the school office before going to class. Note: Students are responsible to provide excuses for tardies and absences.
- 3. Three unexcused tardies equal one unexcused absence. Note: A student who is 20 minutes or more late to a class is marked as absent.
- 4. Two unexcused absences will result in a student/parent/administration contact.
- 5. Five unexcused absences (total absences not five per class) will result in the student being brought to the PAA administration for review and an appropriate consequence. Note: If a student has no tardies or absences for one week they may have an unexcused absence removed from their attendance record.
- 6. Chapel attendance is required. Chapel attendance will be taken each week. A student not attending chapel will be dealt with according to numbers 3, 4 and 5 above.



Student Life

Parkview Adventist Academy is a Community comprised of a wide variety of backgrounds. As members of this community, we find our common centre and unity in the person of Jesus Christ. We seek to honour Him by encouraging each other to develop mentally and spiritually, integrating faith and learning, and maturing in Christ. Because of this spiritual commitment and lifestyle, we strive for order, peace, unity, and demonstrating love and concern for one another.

WORSHIP

Sabbath Observance:

The Sabbath, from sundown Friday until sundown Saturday, is a time for spiritual refreshment, Christian sharing, and rest. Sabbath school takes place in the Ablaze Youth Room each sabbath at 10:30. Please plan to attend.

Chapel

Chapel is held every Monday (or the first day following a break). This is the only time we meet as an entire student body each week. Important announcements are made an attendance is mandatory. If a student must work during this time, they must apply at the PAA office to have their absences excused.

Week of Prayer

One week each semester is set aside to be a time of spiritual refreshing for students, faculty, and staff. Attendance is mandatory.

Service

Service is defined as students reaching out to make a difference in their community. Service opportunities are presented throughout the year and students are strongly encouraged to participate.

Mission Trips

Mission trips take place at the scheduling of the Chaplain in conjunction with administration. Students wishing to participate in these trips will submit application to the mission trip committee for approval. Requirements for participation include the following:

- Student must be in good academic standing
- Student must be trustworthy and able to comply to authority
- Priority will be given to students who have not previously participated in a PAA mission trip
- Priority will be given to grade 11 and 12 students (as grade 10 students will have an opportunity for later trips)
- Participation in mission trips is not a right and will be evaluated by the committee on a case by case basis
- All funds necessary for the trip are the sole responsibility of the student. Any outstanding amounts will be applied to the students account for remittance.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

Music, Games, Videos, etc.

Any music, games, videos, etc should reflect Christian standards and ideals.

Occult

Occultist practices are strictly forbidden. Any literature, posters, signs, games, music, or materials of such nature will be confiscated.

Pornography

Pornographic materials are not permitted.

Substance Abuse

Possession, consumption, and/or distribution of tobacco in any form, alcoholic beverages of all types, non-medicinal drugs, and abuse of prescription drugs is strictly prohibited on or away from campus.

Harassment/Bullying

Harassment towards/bullying against any student, male or female, will not be tolerated. This is not only a moral issue, but also a legal one. Harassment includes derogatory or crude comments directed towards an individual or individuals; care must be exercised to treat members of our Community with respect.

Respect

As a Christian Community, we want to foster a healthy relationship with God and with others. In language, students are to refrain from swearing, obscenity, vulgarity, and disrespect towards any person.

On-Campus Visitors

Each visitor is expected to comply with **all** campus standards of conduct. To bring a friend to class, you must first clear it with your teacher, then receive approval for said visitor from either the principal or vice-principal. ALL visitors to the school must sign in at the office immediately upon arrival.

Student Relationships

Students should conduct themselves in and out of the classroom in a manner that is consistent with Christian values. Displays of affection need to be of an appropriate nature and be in harmony with Christian principles and mindful of the school environment.

Student Appearance and Clothing

Personal appearance reflects character. Girls and boys alike should carefully consider the clothing they choose to wear. All clothing worn should be based on the standard of Christian modesty, neatness, and Biblical principles. Modesty is not easily defined and if students are needing a lesson in modesty, one will be provided through the office.

Modesty Basics

- No underclothing should be visible at any time
- The midsection of your body (mid thigh to shoulders) should be adequately covered at all times.
- Jewelry is a hot button issue. So avoid the issue and leave it at home.

Student Drivers

Driver training classes are offered through the office each school year. Students with a valid driver's licence can obtain a parking pass through campus security using this link. Students are not permitted to travel in another student's vehicle for school sponsored events. Please make alternate travel arrangements.

All full-time students at PAA automatically become members of this association. Elections are held at the end of the school year and in September. Safety

Attendance

While attendance is a vital component of academic success, it is also a cornerstone of safety. To maximize child safety, it is imperative that parents or guardians notify the school ahead of time, where possible, of any student absences.

Students are expected to be in class unless they are ill or there are otherwise extenuating circumstances. If a student will miss or has missed a class, the absence must be addressed at the PAA office.

Discipline

There are times when PAA must discipline a student for the well-being of that student and to maintain the integrity of the community. The Discipline Committee is made up of PAA administration a PAA teacher and a board member. Discipline ranges from increased monitoring (probationary status) to expulsions.

Fire Drills

The law requires periodic fire drills at PAA. When the fire alarm sounds, everyone is to leave the building by the nearest fire exit. Once outside the building, students are to remain with their class until they are informed otherwise by their teacher.

Property

It is expected that students will respect school property, the property of others, and their own personal property and to conduct themselves in a safe manner.

Student Insurance

Accident or injury insurance is provided for the students for each day of the school year.

Financial Information

Private education differs from the public system by allowing a student to experience strong academic instruction, overtly blended with social and spiritual values. The cost of private education to the individual student is higher than the public systems; however, PAA strives to maintain an affordable cost for its secondary education.

In planning a program of high school studies, consideration should be given to the school year as a unit, consisting of two semesters beginning in August and ending in June. Plans to meet financial obligations should be made in advance with our financial manager for the entire school year.

Students may not be allowed to register for a new semester unless their accounts are up-to-date. No transcript or diploma will be issued for a student whose account is not paid in full.

If circumstances should at any time alter a student's financial position, he or she (or parent/guardian) should consult the Financial Manager as soon as possible.

Tuition rates are charged to student's accounts twice a year, 50% each semester. The tuition rate is not based on the number of credits the student is taking but a flat rate charged per semester. Therefore, it is in the student's best interest to take as many classes as they are able per semester.

Educational and Related Costs

Study Costs

The cost of studying at the academy includes several components. Your application packet has a breakdown of these fees, as well as information from Burman University if a student requires housing.

Accident Insurance Policy

PAA carries a standard insurance policy, which covers medical expenses incurred as a result of an accident sustained by a student while enrolled. In the event of an accident while at work, a student will receive medical expenses and loss of time coverage under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Board.

Scholarships

PAA has a variety of scholarships available to incoming and current students. Many entrance scholarships are available to students graduating from junior academies across Western Canada. Report cards are issued electronically via Edsby at the end of each semester.

Panther Athletics

Participation

Participation in Panther Athletics programs require students to maintain a 65% average in all classes. Failure to do so will result in "benching" until grades return to an appropriate level.

Trips and Tournaments

Students are expected to represent our school and our faith when participating in tournaments and trips. All student behaviour policies apply for the duration of the trip and failure to comply will result in disciplinary action. This includes (but is not limited too) respect towards coaches, referees and players from any team, unsportsmanlike conduct, misuse of controlled substances, vulgar language, or inappropriate behaviour of any kind.
